Snow Days

Most of the school districts in the county missed about fifteen days (some more, some fewer) this winter on account of bad weather. Last week, Ohio's legislature added four days to the traditional five calamity days granted to schools statewide. Some districts also took advantage of the "Blizzard Bag" option, which posts lessons online for students to complete at home. This option can compensate for up to three additional days of instruction. And finally, several districts were able to make up a day by changing a day of professional development to a day of instruction. The rest of the missed days will be made up during scheduled spring breaks or at the end of the school year.

Next year, schools will be able to use hours of instruction to meet their required number of days. If the school day in a district exceeds the minimum requirement, the extra time can accumulate to make up for days missed. If any part of this remains unclear, please call the Ohio Department of Education or your representative in the Ohio State House.

Public Schools

I want to take this opportunity to say that I am and always have been a believer in our public schools. I know how hard most teachers work and how much of their time outside of school they devote to preparing lessons, grading papers, attending school activities, and so on. Schools today are taking a great deal of criticism from numerous sources. Some outspoken local critics of our schools, I'm sorry to say, make their living teaching in public schools but choose to send their children to private schools. Laws and mandates come down from people who have no idea what the schools have to deal with. Every employee of the Ohio Department of Education should be required to spend at least a semester in the classroom every four or five years. They would quickly learn to sing a new tune.
